



Distribution of suspicions/charges against people born in 1996 (while 10-17 years old) – All offences N=29.086




Distribution of suspicions/charges against people born in 1996 (while 10-17 year old) – Penal code offences N=14.815




Number of suspicions/charges against children and young people aged 10-17 years






The proportion in each year group who were suspected/charged until 18th birthday





Relapse into crime, 10-15-year olds (Proportion registered for crime 2001-2013, and who were registered once more during the following two years. Percent)





Number of suspicions/charges against 10-17-year olds disaggregated by type of crime, 2006-2016






Number of suspicions/charges disaggregated by sex, 2006-2016

Why is there a decline in juvenile delinquency? - some possible explanations...
